SOUTH SUDAN

SUDAN, when a single country, was the largest country in Africa and deeply divided. A brutal civil war between the mainly Muslim North and the Christian or animist South in which two million people were killed and over four million were displaced lasted 21 years until the Comprehensive Peace Agreement (CPA) was signed in 2005.

The long civil war destroyed the country's entire infrastructure. Most of the South still has no proper medical services, roads, clean water, electricity supply or schools.

The CPA gave partial autonomy to the South but sadly, the Khartoum Government did not fully honour the terms of the Agreement, particularly the distribution of oil revenues and the demarcation of the North/South border.

South Sudan gained formal independence from Sudan on 9 July 2011, but civil war broke out again in the Republic of South Sudan in 2013. The civil war finally came to an end in February 2020, but peace continues to be fragile.

South Sudan is bordered by Ethiopia, Sudan, Central African Republic, Democratic Republic of the Congo, Uganda and Kenya.

Its population was estimated as 12.8 million in 2019.

In 2006, the Pewsey Vale Team Council decided to support Reverend Samuel Peni's ministry following his six-week visit with the team through the Salisbury diocese.

This led to the formation of the Sudan Support Group.

Nursery School in Nzara

Nzara, a remote area in Southwest South Sudan near the Congo border, faces high poverty and limited employment.

The region is occasionally impacted by attacks from the Lord's Resistance Army (LRA), which operates across several countries.

When Bishop Samuel sought input from his congregation, education emerged as a top priority due to widespread illiteracy - only 2% of Sudan's population had received primary schooling at the time.

In response, a nursery school for 40 children was established in 2010 with support from the Sudan Support Group.

In 2013, The St Timothy Foundation was registered as charity number 1151171, succeeding the Sudan Support Group.

Thanks to generous donations and dedicated fundraising, the St Timothy Foundation continues to support free education at St Timothy's School in Nzara. The students are flourishing - they demonstrate outstanding behaviour, consistently perform well in Ugandan national assessments, and show strong mastery of the curriculum.

Their academic progress is a testament to their resilience, hard work, and the supportive learning environment the school provides.

In 2025, St Timothy's School has over 1,000 students and the first students are sitting exams to allow attendance at University in Kampala.

Several other projects have been funded:

- A women's education program to help women who otherwise would have had no chance of an education.
- An AIDS awareness program for youth leaders.
- A project to provide Girls' Hygiene Kits. These provide washable towels and other essentials.
- Training of Traditional Birth Attendants to reduce the appalling level of infant mortality.

The St Timothy Foundation also supports women's microfinance projects in Nzara and in Yambio to enable more women to generate a sustainable income and be self-sufficient. With inflation running high our grants in this area need to increase.

In 2015 a borehole was provided in Nzara to bring clean fresh water to the community. Previously water had been carried a great distance.

In 2025 we helped to fund a project to provide water to St Timothy's School without the need for carrying it from the local borehole.



This greatly improves hydration and hygiene for the children and staff and improves working conditions in the school kitchen.
